
## **Voter turnout in US elections**

## **Critical Analysis**

- 1. Based on the trends from these two charts, what will the likely voter turnout rate be for the 2020 general election?
- 2. What percentage of voters turned out in the 2018 midterm and how much, on average, does general election voter turnout go up from the previous midterm election?
- 3. Has the voter turnout of any midterm election ever been higher than the voter turnout of any presidential election?
- 4. What do you <u>predict voter turnout will be in 2020?</u>\*\* And ask your teacher to <u>make a prediction on our google form</u>. And then see how close your predictions were once the results come in (which could take a while\*)
- 5. What story do the above charts tell about the increase in voter turnout between midterm and general elections?
- 6. Why do more people vote in general than in midterm elections?
- 7. What is one consequence of this?
- 8. What happened to the Republican House majority as a result of the massive turnout of 2018 midterm election? And what generally happens to the party in power when there is a large increase in voter turnout?
- 9. These charts tell about voter turnout. What other information would you need to know in order to more accurately predict which party will likely win in the 2020 election?
- 10. Is it true that in Colorado there is always a *high voter* turnout?
- 11. We think a lot about the presidential election, but how will high voter turnout in 2020 impact down-ballot races (races other than the presidency)?
- 12. How do you think this information influenced the Biden and Trump 2020 presidential campaigns?
- 13. Remember, even if we have record high voter turnout, about 1/4 of the people who could vote won't vote in 2020. What would you say to those non-voters?
- 14. Make a claim about who will win the 2020 election and support it with data and your knowledge of U.S. government and politics.
